Most recently, he was the owner and principal of InSequitur LLC, a consulting firm. Previously Mr. Howe was Executive Vice President of the Olive Group, focusing on strategic development and alignment at the global corporate level. Mr. Howe also served as Senior Vice President & General Counsel of Veridian Corporation where he had broad responsibility for developing and implementing corporate strategy, leading key negotiations, and driving implementation and closure of major strategic initiatives. He also directed the company's legal, governance and legislative activities.

Before joining the corporate world, Mr. Howe had been a partner in the Washington, D.C. law firm of Steptoe & Johnson, LLP. While at Steptoe & Johnson, Mr. Howe served as outside counsel to Veridian and other top defense, aerospace and information technology companies—including Boeing, Hughes, McDonnell Douglas, and Motorola. Before private practice, Mr. Howe was a law clerk for Judge George MacKinnon of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit, a leading federal jurist.

Mr. Howe has served as chair of the Washington Space Business Roundtable and as president of the Federal Circuit Bar Association. He currently serves as a moderator with Aspen Institute, as a Director of Intermap Technologies Corporation and as Treasurer of the All America PAC.

Mr. Howe received his J.D. cum laude from Harvard Law School, where he was an editor of the Harvard Law Review; his honors M.A. in modern history and economics from Oxford University in the United Kingdom, where he was a Sachs Scholar; and his A.B. magna cum laude from Princeton University and its Woodrow Wilson School of Public & International Affairs.
